Why is looking after our environment important?

Our environment is really important for several reasons:

Plants and animals are important for human life

The environment is much more attractive if we look after it

We need to preserve it for our futures and the future for everybody else



Why do people litter?

Sometimes, children litter by accident, but often, it is because they are busy doing something and think that someone else will pick up their rubbish.

Helpful tips to reduce litter:

Put your litter straight in the bin

At school, put fruit/vegetable leftovers in the green bins outside and other rubbish in the black bins. In class, use the yellow bins for paper waste.

Try to bring a healthy snack in a reusable tub, or bring a piece of fruit that doesn't need a wrapper



Some surprising information about litter:


Some litter such as plastic wrappers, straws etc. can take hundreds of years to decompose

Animals can be hurt and even die because of litter

If someone drops chewing gum on the ground, it does not decompose like food - it is like plastic waste



What you can do to help:



If the other person does not pick it up, tell an adult

If you helpfully pick up any litter, always wash your hands afterwards and never pick up something if you are unsure what it is





Other ways to help the environment:

Save energy by switching off lights and devices when not in use

Save heat by keeping doors closed

Try not to waste paper and think about what could be recycled

Try not to waste water - don't leave taps running




What parents can do:

- Encourage saving water, energy and waste


